

Mayor's Corner october 2020

First, I wanted to wish everyone a Happy Halloween. There have been no particular guidelines or mandates relating to trick or treating as I write this. I do want everyone to be careful and follow the procedures that are in place already. Be sure to wear an appropriate mask and maintain social

distancing when you are around non-family members. And as always, practice the other regular safety recommendations associated with Halloween.

Immediately following Halloween is the election. I want to encourage you to exercise your right to vote by voting during this campaign.

You can't turn on the TV or scroll through Facebook without being reminded of the various candidates that are vying for your votes. What you may not be aware of are the three issues on the ballot affecting policy and funding that you should know about before you go vote.

For this conversation, I would like to bring to your attention the one referred to as "Issue 1". This item has the potential to have a significant impact on Bryant, and surrounding communities.

Issue 1 - the "0.5% State Sales Tax for State, County and City Roads, Bridges and Other Surface Transportation." (or the Transportation Sales Tax Continuation Amendment)

- This is NOT a "new tax". This issue is a continuation of an existing tax that
 is already in place but is set to expire in June 2023.
- Combined, Saline County and all of its municipalities will lose a total of approximately 2.5 million dollars if this funding does not remain in effect.
 This amendment asks voters to:
- Approve the continuation of the 0.5% state sales tax, making it permanent.

- Allow the state to continue using revenue from this tax to maintain, repair, and improve highways, roads, and streets across the state.
- Divide the revenue under an existing formula of 70% going to the Arkansas Department of Transportation, 15% to county governments, and 15% to city governments for roads, bridges, and "other surface transportation."

Without continuing this current tax, Bryant will lose about \$389,000.00 each year in state funds. The loss of these funds could dramatically slow street repairs in Bryant and street improvement projects such as the proposed improvements to the Springhill and Hilltop Road intersection. It will also impact state projects located within the city such as the widening of Highway 5 and intersection safety improvements needed along that area.

I would like to urge all of our residents to thoroughly research any impact that losing this funding would have on our city, as well as many municipalities throughout Arkansas before Voting in November. WATERSHED IDEAS

FROM THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

By October 19, our first nine weeks of school during the global pandemic will be completed. It's so good to have our students back in classrooms. For a district of approximately 9,510 students (PreK-12) and 1,100 staff, our number of active cases has been very low. Before school started, many of our administrators (including me) believed we would have been forced to move to all virtual learning because of high cases. We owe our ability to still be onsite to the diligence of our staff members and students in following safety protocols.

About 25% of our students are learning virtually. Our virtual model utilizes our own teachers for instruction. Students are expected to log on to Zoom and Google Classroom, following the same bell schedule as onsite students. We are extremely proud of the teachers who have taken on the challenge to educate students online.

For the parents who have made the commitment, we appreciate your dedication to your student's education. Online learning does have its challenges. It's new for all of us. Basic technical issues are front and center, as well as the lack of internet access for some of our families. Some students miss their friends and the opportunity to interact with others in a typical classroom setting. Principals and teachers are working hard to foster relationships with other online students.

We are doing our best to meet the needs of all students—both onsite and online—by providing academic support while keeping them safe. Let's all keep wearing our masks, practicing social distancing, and remaining vigilant about our handwashing, so we can stay in school and continue learning.
