THE DIRECTOR'S CHAIR

It's not very often that residents of Bryant get to hear from or about the City's Human Resources Department. I wanted to take this opportunity to share a little bit about us.

The Human Resources Department consists of three employees total. I am the Director, Alisha Runnells is our Human Resources Manager and Osha Martin is our Human Resources Assistant. Alisha has been with the city for thirteen years and specializes in payroll, employee benefits and on boarding. Osha joined our team just over a year ago and specializes in recruitment and workers compensation. Together we cover all aspects of Human Resources for the city.

Recently, we have focused a great deal of our time on tracking and responding to COVID-19 concerns among our employees. While our doors have been closed to the public, we have remained very busy implementing procedures in order to stay in compliance with new laws and ensure the health and safety of our 250 employees to the best of our ability. We have worked closely with departments to accommodate a variety of new scheduling needs, implementing successful work from home strategies,

and creating workspaces that allow social distancing whenever possible.

We have closely monitored those employees who have been placed on quarantine and have been extremely fortunate that none of our employees' health have been significantly impacted by this virus so far. We have updated our payroll system and processes to track COVID related time in compliance with the new laws and regulations. We have transitioned many of our in-person processes to electronic which has allowed us to continue to hire new employees and support all of the departments as we normally would throughout the city.

This year has been challenging in many ways. As we move towards our 2021 budget planning sessions and our 2020 closeout processes, we remain optimistic and we look forward to continuing to adapt in order to provide the best support we can for our employees, their families and the residents of Bryant.

ANIMAL CONTROL



In the (very) early morning hours of July 27th, weeks of work and collaboration between the Cherokee Village Animal Shelter, the Humane Society of Saline County and Bryant Animal Control & Adoption Center resulted in the successful transport of several dogs to a partner shelter located in Wisconsin. Tricia Power, Bryant Director and Carolyn Parks, Director for the Cherokee Village Shelter made the long drive in a

borrowed van to carry the group of dogs from the three shelters up north. These dogs, left in Arkansas, may have been either euthanized or left to sit in these shelters for months (or even years) awaiting adoption. Since this transport, the majority of the dogs have already been placed into new homes.

This effort, paid for with donated funds, is an important part of becoming a 100% no-kill community in each of these areas. By working together, these communities can do more to help the animals. FROM THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT



Schools are an important part of our community. Local school districts provide safe, supportive learning environments for students, employ teachers and other staff, and enable parents, guardians, and caregivers to work. Schools also provide services that help meet the needs of our children and families through social and emotional learning, creating a safe environment for learning, identifying and addressing neglect and abuse, providing food, and encouraging physical activity.

It's critical that we take all measures necessary to safeguard the health of our Bryant students so we can remain open. Our district will

reinforce mask wearing for all students and staff; encourage frequent hand washing; practice social distancing when possible; and regularly disinfect buses, classrooms, and buildings.

At this time, 27% of our students will be virtual learners. The vast majority (73%) plan to attend classes on site. Both students and teachers will stay prepared to move to online learning in case of class, school, or district closing.

Please know no matter what we face during our return to school, we are committed to serving families in our district and helping build a strong community.
